Details:

This is a supplemental report to the Officer Involved Shooting incident which occurred on August 16, 2020 at 560 N. San Jacinto Street, Hemet, California.

On Sunday, August 16, 2020, at approximately 0700 hours, I was contacted by Supervising Investigator R. Bodmer of the Riverside County District Attorney's Office Bureau of Investigations. Supervising Investigator Bodmer requested I respond to 550 N. San Jacinto Street, in the City of Hemet regarding an Officer Involved Shooting incident. The deceased suspect in this case was later identified as Ysidro Espinoza.

Upon my arrival, Supervising Investigator Tom Reid instructed me to proceed the Hemet Police Department to chart the involved officers. Below is a list of the of the officers that were charted.

The charting was conducted at Hemet Police Department, in their 2nd Floor Conference Room. Present in the room were Hemet PD Lt. Eric Dickson, Hemet PD Corporal G. Alvarez, Supervising Investigator T. Reid, Senior Investigator M. Moreno and Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene.

Charting of Officer Dylan Detwiler

The charting of Officer D. Detwiler began at approximately 1325 hours. It should be noted that Officer Detwiler's Colt M4 Commando Rifle and Remington 870 Less Lethal Shotgun were charted later because they remained in his patrol car at the crime scene. Both weapons were collected by Hemet Police Detective D. Klinzing and Senior Investigator A. Quilantan and later brought to the Hemet Police Department.

Menifee Police Department Crime Scene Specialist C. Keene began by taking overall photographs of Officer Detwiler, from all sides, as he appeared at the time of the shooting. Officer Detwiler was dressed in a department approved Class C uniform, which consisted of a black short sleeved Hemet Police Department shirt, a black load bearing vest (LBV) over the shirt, black Battle Dress Uniform pants, a duty belt, black boots and a black hat that read "CITY OF HEMET POLICE." Officer Detwiler's shirt had patches on each shoulder reading, "City of Hemet Police."

Officer Detwiler's LBV had a cloth "Hemet Police Department" badge on the upper left portion of his LBV and two-name plates along the upper right side which read "D. DETWILER" and "POLICE" both in white lettering. The back of LBV had a large name plate across the back that also read "POLICE" in white lettering. The LBV was equipped with the following items:

Two handgun magazines
Flashlight
HT Radio
Lapel mic
Utility pouch
Body Worn Camera (BWC)

Officer Detwiler also had a black folding knife in his left front pant pocket.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Officer Detwiler to remove his duty belt and place it on a piece of white butcher paper. Crime Specialist C. Keene photographed the duty belt with the pouches open and closed.

Officer Detwiler's duty belt was black leather and consisted, from left to right, the following:

Taser Model X26P (S/N X12006RAK)

Expandable baton

Flashlight

Single handcuff case with a set a handcuff's

Single handcuff case with a set a handcuff's

Tourniquet

Duty weapon and holster

Key holder

Key clip

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene removed Officer Detwiler's duty weapon from his holster, two additional magazines from his LBV and placed them on the white butcher paper. I found Officer Detwiler's duty weapon to be a Glock 21, (S/N VLS928), .45 caliber Semi-automatic handgun with a Streamlight TLR-1 HL tactical light mounted on it. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 13 live "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" cartridge casing and the maximum capacity for this magazine was 13. Officer Detwiler's two additional magazines were inspected and I found one magazine to contain 13 live cartridge casings and the other contained 12 live cartridge casings.

1st Magazine: 13 Speer LE Gold Dot 45

2nd Magazine: 12 Speer LE Gold Dot 45

I asked Officer Detwiler if he carried and backup weapon and he stated he did not. Officer Detwiler stated he had a Colt M4 Rifle magazine in his BDU's right side cargo pocket. Officer Detwiler removed the magazine from his right cargo packet and placed on the white butcher paper. Crime Specialist C. Keene photographed the magazine and removed 25 live "FC 223 Rem" cartridges from the magazine. The capacity for this magazine was 30.

Charting of Officer Nicholas Schroeder

The charting of Officer N. Schroeder began at approximately 1343 hours. Menifee Police Department Crime Scene Specialist C. Keene began by taking overall photographs of Officer Schroeder, from all sides, as he appeared at the time of the shooting. Officer Schroeder was dressed in a department approved Class C uniform, which consisted of a black short sleeved Hemet Police Department shirt, a black load bearing vest (LBV) over the shirt, black Battle Dress Uniform pants, a duty belt and black boots. Officer Schroeder's shirt had patches on each shoulder reading, "City of Hemet Police."

Officer Schroeder's LBV had a cloth "Hemet Police Department" badge on the upper left portion of his LBV and two-name plates along the upper right side which read "N. SCHROEDER" and "POLICE" both in white lettering. The back of LBV had a large name plate across the back that also read "POLICE" in white lettering. The LBV was equipped with the following items:

Two handgun magazines

Flashlight

HT Radio and lapel microphone

Utility pouch

Backup weapon (SW 38 revolver)

Body Worn Camera (BWC)

Expandable Baton

Two handcuff cases with handcuffs

Officer Schroeder also had a black folding knife in his left rear pant pocket.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Officer Schroeder to remove his duty belt and place it on a piece of white butcher paper. Crime Specialist C. Keene photographed the duty belt with the pouches open and closed.

Officer Schroeder's duty belt was black nylon and consisted, from left to right, the following:

- Patron ring (empty)
- Key holder
- Single handcuff case with a set a handcuff's
- Single handcuff case with a set a handcuff's
- Duty weapon and holster
- Key clip

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene removed Officer Schroeder's duty weapon from his holster, two additional magazines from his LBV and placed them on the white butcher paper. I found Officer Schroeder's duty weapon to be a STI Staccato P-DUO, (S/N TX19993), 9mm caliber Semi-automatic handgun with a SURE FIRE X300 tactical light mounted on it. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "9mm Speer Luger" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 15 "9mm Speer Luger" live cartridge casing. The capacity for the magazine was 20. Officer Detwiler's two additional magazines were inspected and both contained 20 live cartridge casings for a total of 40 live cartridge casings.

- 1st Magazine: 20 Speer Luger 9mm

I asked Officer Schroeder if he carried and backup weapon and he stated he did. Officer Schroeder had a Smith & Wesson Airweight .38 caliber Revolver, (S/N CYH7229) inside the utility pouch of his LBV. Officer Schroeder's back up weapon was loaded with 5 live .38 caliber "Speer 38 SPL+P" cartridge casings.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene retained Officer Schroeder's primary handgun, his 3 magazines and all the live cartridge casing as evidence.

Charting of Officer Daniel Caballero

The charting of Senior Officer D. Caballero began at approximately 1405 hours. Menifee Police Department Crime Scene Specialist C. Keene began by taking overall photographs of Officer Caballero, from all sides, as he appeared at the time of the shooting. Officer Caballero was dressed in a department approved Class C uniform, which consisted of a black short sleeved Hemet Police Department shirt, a black load bearing vest (LBV) over the shirt, black Battle Dress Uniform pants, a duty belt and black boots. Officer Caballero's shirt had patches on each shoulder reading, "City of Hemet Police."

Officer Caballero's LBV had a cloth "Hemet Police Department" badge on the upper left portion of his LBV and two-name plates along the upper right side which read "D. CABALLERO" and "POLICE" both in white lettering. The back of LBV had a large name plate across the back that also read "POLICE" in white lettering. The LBV was equipped with the following items:

Officer Caballero's duty belt was black leather and consisted, from left to right, the following:

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene removed Officer Caballero's duty weapon from his holster, three additional magazines from his LBV and placed them on the white butcher paper. I found Officer Schroeder's duty weapon to be a SIG SAUER P320x5, (S/N 58C0766751), 9mm caliber Semi-automatic handgun with a Streamlight TLR-2 tactical light mounted on it. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "9mm Speer Luger" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 22 "9mm Speer Luger" live cartridge casing. The capacity for the magazine was 22. Officer Caballero's three additional magazines were inspected, and each contained 22 live cartridge casings for a total of 66 live cartridge casings.

I asked Officer Caballero if he carried a backup weapon and he stated he did not. Officer Caballero's weapon was not collected as evidence.

Charting of Officer Christopher Maker

The charting of Officer C. Maker began at approximately 1430 hours. Menifee Police Department Crime Scene Specialist C. Keene began by taking overall photographs of Officer Maker, from all sides, as he appeared at the time of the shooting. Officer Maker was dressed in a department approved Class B uniform, which consisted of a blue long sleeve Hemet Police Department shirt, blue trousers, a duty belt and black boots. Officer Maker's shirt had patches on each shoulder reading, "City of Hemet Police."

Officer Maker's uniform shirt had a silver, "Hemet Police Department" badge on the upper left portion and a silver name plate along the upper right side which read, "C. MAKER".

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Officer Maker to remove his duty belt and place it on a piece of white butcher paper. Crime Specialist C. Keene photographed the duty belt.

I found Officer Maker's duty weapon to be a SIG SAUER P220, (S/N G410829), .45 caliber Semi-automatic handgun with a Streamlight TLR-2 tactical light mounted on it. Crime

Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 10 "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" live cartridge casing. The capacity for the magazine was 10. Officer Maker's 4 additional magazines were inspected, and each contained 10 live "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" cartridge casings for a total of 40 live cartridge casings.

Charting of Officer Colby Skaug

The charting of Officer C. Skaug began at approximately 1443 hours. Menifee Police Department Crime Scene Specialist C. Keene began by taking overall photographs of Officer Skaug, from all sides, as he appeared at the time of the shooting. Officer Skaug was dressed in a department approved Class B uniform, which consisted of a blue long sleeve Hemet Police Department shirt, blue trousers, a duty belt and black boots. Officer Skaug's shirt had patches on each shoulder reading, "City of Hemet Police."

Officer Skaug's uniform shirt had a silver, "Hemet Police Department" badge on the upper left portion and a silver name plate along the upper right portion which read, "C. SKAUG". Officer Skaug also had a pen in his front left shirt pocket.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Officer Skaug to remove his duty belt and place it on a piece of white butcher paper. Crime Specialist C. Keene photographed the duty belt.

Officer Skaug's duty belt was black leather and consisted, from left to right, the following:

I found Officer Skaug's duty weapon to be a Glock 21 GEN IV, (S/N BETR846), .45 caliber Semi-automatic handgun with a SURE FIRE X300 tactical light mounted on it. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 10 "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" live cartridge casings. The capacity for the magazine was 10. Officer Maker's 2 additional magazines were inspected, and each contained 10 live "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" cartridge casings for a total of 20 live cartridge casings.

The capacity for the magazine was 13. Officer Reynoso's 2 additional magazines were inspected, and each contained 13 live "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" cartridge casings for a total of 26 live cartridge casings.

I asked Officer Reynoso if he carried a backup weapon and he stated he did not. Officer Reynoso's weapon was not collected as evidence.

Charting of Corporal Brent Christianson

The charting of Corporal B. Christianson began at approximately 1523 hours. Menifee Police Department Crime Scene Specialist C. Keene began by taking overall photographs of Corporal Christianson, from all sides, as he appeared at the time of the shooting. Corporal Christianson was dressed in a department approved Class B uniform, which consisted of a blue short-sleeved Hemet Police Department shirt, blue trousers, a duty belt and black boots. Corporal Christianson's shirt had patches on each shoulder reading, "City of Hemet Police" along with Corporal stripes just below the "City of Hemet Police" patch.

Corporal Christianson's uniform shirt had a silver, "Hemet Police Department" badge on the upper left portion and a silver name plate along the upper right portion which read, "C. CHRISTIANSON." Corporal Christianson also had a pen and handcuff key in his front left shirt pocket. Corporal Christianson also had his Body Worn Camera, (BWC) attached to the front of his uniform shirt.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Corporal Christianson to remove his duty belt and place it on a piece of white butcher paper. Crime Specialist C. Christianson photographed the duty belt.

Corporal Christianson's duty belt was black leather and consisted, from left to right, the following:

Two handgun magazines

Expandable Baton

Taser Model X26P (S/N X1200306Y)

HT Radio and lapel microphone
Flashlight
Single handcuff case with a set a handcuff's
Single handcuff case with a set a handcuff's
Key Holder
Duty weapon and holster
Tourniquet

Corporal Christianson also had a flashlight his left front pant pocket and a knife in his right front pant pocket.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene removed Corporal Christianson's duty weapon from his holster and the two magazines and placed them on the white butcher paper. I found Corporal Christianson's duty weapon to be a Glock 19, (S/N BDUB976), 9mm caliber Semi-automatic handgun with a SURE FIRE X300 tactical light mounted on it. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "9mm Speer Luger" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 20 "9mm Speer Luger" live cartridge casings. The capacity for the magazine was 20. Corporal Christianson's two additional magazines were inspected, and each contained 20 live cartridge casings for a total of 40 live cartridge casings.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Corporal Christianson to place his duty rifle on the white butcher paper. I found Corporal Christianson's duty rifle to be a Colt M4 Commando, (S/N A0400560), 5.56mm caliber semiautomatic rifle. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "FC 223 REM" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 28 "FC 223 REM" live cartridge casings. The capacity for the magazine was 30. Corporal Christianson's rifle was loaded with a total of 29 live cartridge casings.

1st Magazine: 28 "FC 223 REM"

I asked Corporal Christianson if he carried and backup weapon and he stated he did not. Corporal Christianson's weapons were not collected as evidence.

Charting of Detective Craig Willison

The charting of Detective C. Willison began at approximately 1531 hours. Menifee Police Department Crime Scene Specialist C. Keene began by taking overall photographs of Detective C. Willison, from all sides, as he appeared at the time of the shooting. Detective C. Willison was dressed in a department approved Class D uniform, which consisted of a black short sleeve Hemet Police Department shirt, a black load bearing vest (LBV) over the shirt, tan Battle Dress Uniform pants, a black nylon belt and black boots. Detective C. Willison's also had his detective badge clipped to the right front side on his belt.

Detective C. Willison's LBV had a cloth "Hemet Police Department" Detective badge on the upper left portion of his LBV and two-name plates along the upper right side which read "C.WILLISON" and "POLICE" both in white lettering. The back of LBV had a large name plate across the back that also read "POLICE" in white lettering. The LBV was equipped with the following items:

Utility pouch
HT Radio with an earpiece microphone
Three handgun magazines (2 Glock 17 & 1 Glock 21)
Expandable baton
Flashlight
Handcuff case containing a set of handcuffs
Duty weapon and holster

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Detective C. Willison to remove his duty belt and place it on a piece the white butcher paper.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene removed Detective C. Willison's duty weapon from his holster, the four magazines from his LBV and placed them on the white butcher paper. I found Detective C. Willison's duty weapon to be a Glock 17, (S/N BMBE979), 9mm caliber Semi-automatic handgun with a Streamlight TLR-1 HL tactical light mounted on it. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "9mm Speer Luger" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 17 live "9mm Speer Luger" cartridge casings and the maximum capacity for this magazine was 17. Detective C. Willison's three additional magazines were inspected and two contained 17 live "9mm Speer Luger" cartridge casings and the other contained 13 "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" live cartridge casings.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Detective C. Willison to place his duty rifle on the white butcher paper. I found Detective C. Willison's duty rifle to be a LWRC M6, (S/N 03-22420), 5.56mm caliber semiautomatic rifle. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "FC 223 REM" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine contained 28 "FC 223 REM" live cartridge casings. The capacity for the magazine was 30. Detective C. Willison rifle was loaded with a total of 29 live cartridge casings.

1st Magazine: 28 "FC 223 REM"

I asked Detective C. Willison if he carried and backup weapon and he stated he did not. Detective C. Willison's weapons were not collected as evidence.

Charting of Detective Brian Wood

The charting of Detective C. Willison began at approximately 1548 hours. Menifee Police Department Crime Scene Specialist C. Keene began by taking overall photographs of Detective B. Wood, from all sides, as he appeared at the time of the shooting. Detective B. Wood was dressed in a department approved Class D uniform, which consisted of a black short sleeve Hemet Police Department shirt, a black load bearing vest (LBV) over the shirt, tan Battle Dress Uniform pants, a black nylon belt and black boots. Detective B. Wood also had his detective badge clipped to the right front side on his belt.

Detective B. Wood's LBV had a cloth "Hemet Police Department" Detective badge on the upper left portion of his LBV and a name plate along the upper right side which read "POLICE" in white lettering. The back of LBV had a large name plate across the back that also read "POLICE" in white lettering. The LBV was equipped with the following items:

Body Worn Camera (BWC)

Utility pouch

Dagger

HT Radio

Three handgun magazines (2 Glock 19 & 1 Colt 1911)

Expandable baton

Two handcuff cases and each contained a set of handcuffs

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene instructed Detective B. Wood to remove his belt and place it on a piece of white butcher paper.

Menifee Police Department Crime Specialist C. Keene removed Detective B. Wood's duty weapon from his holster, the three magazines from his LBV and placed them on the white butcher paper. I found Detective B. Wood's duty weapon to be a Glock 19, (S/N BFLK158), 9mm caliber Semi-automatic handgun. Crime Specialist C. Keene removed the magazine from the weapon and removed one "9mm Speer Luger" live cartridge casing from the chamber. The magazine

contained 15 live "9mm Speer Luger" cartridge casings and the maximum capacity for this magazine was 15. Detective B. Wood's three additional magazines were inspected and two contained 15 live "9mm Speer Luger" cartridge casings and the other contained 10 "Speer LE Gold Dot 45" live cartridge casings.

1st Magazine: 15 "9mm Speer Luger"

2nd Magazine: 15 "9mm Speer Luger"

3rd Magazine: 10 "Speer LE Gold Dot 45"

I asked Detective B. Wood if he carried and backup weapon and he stated he did not. Detective B. Wood's weapon was not collected as evidence.

Charting of Officer Dylan Detwiler cont.

At approximately 1558 hours, the charting of Officer D. Detwiler's duty rifle and less lethal shotgun began. Detective D. Klinzing cleared the rifle and Hemet Police Department Property Evidence Technician Aubrey Murphy placed Officer Detwiler's duty rifle on a piece of white butcher paper. I found Officer D. Detwiler's duty rifle to be a Colt M4 Commando, (S/N A0222611), 5.56mm caliber semiautomatic rifle and it contained no magazine or cartridges. Property Technician A. Murphy photographed and retained the rifle as evidence.

Detective D. Klinzing placed Officer D. Detwiler's less lethal shotgun on the piece of white butcher paper. I found Officer D. Detwiler's less lethal shotgun to be a Remington 870, (S/N V512838V) 12-gauge shotgun. Detective D. Klinzing cleared the shotgun and I found that it containing one live "West Coast Ammunition", 12 gauge bean bag round in the barrel, two live "West Coast Ammunition", 12 gauge bean bag rounds in the magazine and two live "West Coast Ammunition", 12 gauge bean bag rounds in the shotguns side saddle round holder. Property Technician A. Murphy photographed and retained the shotgun as evidence.

At about 1610 hours, on this date, the charting of all the officer was completed.
